





4	batteries	Batteries are sorted by type (lead acid, nickel-cadmium, nickel-metal-hydride and lithium ion) and they are then deconstructed so that the components can be used to make new products.
	car batteries	Automotive batteries are typically made with up to 80 percent recycled materials. These batteries are separated into various components, lead, plastic and water, these components are then repurposed into new products.
	paper and cardboard	Most types of paper and card can be recycled in north London. Please ensure they are clean and free from dirt, food, grease, or paint. You can recycle newspapers, magazines, catalogues (remove any plastic wrapping or freebies), coated paper with a thin shiny finish, leaflets, flyers, envelopes (including windowed), cardboard, greetings cards without glitter, other household paper like computer paper and letters, shredded paper (in an envelope), and unused wallpaper. Your card is sorted at London recycling facilities and sent to mills in the UK and abroad (France, Germany, Poland, Taiwan and Turkey). It's then recycled into brand-new card.
	cooking oil	Your cooking oil is converted into Bio Fuel which can be used to power eco-friendly power stations to generate renewable energy used to power homes and businesses across the UK.

	electrical	Waste Electricals (WEEE) can be dropped off at our recycling centre. They contain metals, plastics, and other materials that can be recovered through recycling and used to create new products.
	mixed textiles & clothes	Textiles collected in the UK are sorted locally before being sent primarily to the UAE. From there, they are either resold for reuse or recycled into new materials.
	mobile phones	Mobile phones contain small quantities of precious metals like gold, silver, platinum and copper which can all be repurposed once processed. Mobile phones also contain a large amount of plastic which is widely recyclable.
	paint	Please drop off your unwanted or leftover paint at any of our Reuse and Recycling Centres. Look for the marked paint containers. Residents can take paint away for free! Just ask a member of our team to see what colours are available. It's a great way to reduce waste, save money, and give paint a second life. Leftover paint is passed on to Forest Recycling Group, a local community organisation in Waltham Forest, so it can be reused.
67	Carpet Recycling	You can dispose of carpets at one of North London's Reuse and Recycling Centres (RRCs) or through your local council's bulky waste collection service. If your carpet is in reusable condition, it can be taken to one of our DIY reuse points at South Access Road RRC in Waltham Forest or Summers Lane RRC in Barnet. This helps reduce waste and gives materials a second life.

	used engine oil	Every litre of the engine oil deposited on our sites is fully recovered and is either processed to produce high specification fuel oil or recycled for re-use as base oil in fuel production.
	fluorescent tubes	Fluorescent tubes are classified as hazardous waste so please be careful not to break them when removing them and transporting them. Once on site we will store them safely until a collection can be arranged. From there, your tubes are separated, the mercury is removed and reused and the glass is sent to be recycled into new products.
E	garden waste	Your garden waste is taken to composting facilities in Cambridgeshire and London. It goes through a two-stage process: first, it's enclosed to start decomposing (in-vessel composting), then it's moved outdoors and turned regularly (open windrow composting). The finished compost is used on local farms and in horticulture.
	mixed glass bottles & jars	Most glass can be recycled in north London — just empty and rinse items first. You can recycle bottles of any colour, jars with lids removed, and non-food glass bottles like perfume or aftershave (with lids removed). Only bottles and jars are accepted in your household recycling. Other types of glass, like cookware or drinking glasses, melt different temperatures and can cause imperfections when mixed in. Glass is 100% recyclable and can be recycled endlessly without loss in quality or purity — something few food and beverage packaging options can claim. Glass is always recycled in the UK. After sorting, it's sent to specialist facilities in Essex, Pontefract, Brentford, Derbyshire and South Yorkshire. There, it's turned into new bottles or reused in road building.

	hardcore & rubble	Hardcore and rubble are sent to a nearby processing facility, where they are transformed into recycled aggregates. These materials are then used in construction projects throughout London and the UK.
COLOUR	printer cartridges	Every effort is made to ensure that your cartridges do not go to landfill. Once collected from our sites, your used ink cartridges are sorted and any reusable cartridges are sold on to be relabeled and refilled. Cartridges that cannot be reused are then broken down and recycled into new products.
	scrap metal	Unlike other waste streams, metal does not lose its integrity once it has been recycled, which means it can be recycled time and time again. your metals are taken to be sorted by type, shredded and eventually melted down to produce new products.
	wood & timber	Wood and timber collected in the UK is sent overseas, where it is typically processed into chipboard for use in manufacturing and construction.

At LondonEnergy, our facility in Edmonton, North London, converts waste unsuitable for recycling into energy.

Non-recyclable waste is incinerated to create electricity. This process powers around 80,000 homes and businesses each year.


